RAISING THE BAR

Midwest Transplant Network (MTN) performed among the top organ procurement organizations (OPOs) nationally in 2021 for number of organ donors and number of organs transplanted. These records represent our continual commitment to saving and enhancing more lives through organ, eye and tissue donation. Our staff members strive each day to reduce the waitlist for organ transplants and to provide tissues for those in need. The mission of MTN impacts the lives of all recipients, the recipients' family members and friends as well as donor families and friends. This hard work contributed to the U.S. officially surpassing 40,000 transplants in one year for the first time in 2021.

We continued raising the bar to improve our performance for all those whose lives can be transformed by donation, and our hard work paid off. We proudly ranked No. 1 among organ procurement organizations nationally for the number of organ donors and No. 2 for the number of transplants as compared to the expected number for hospital-eligible deaths. These metrics are based on the most recent Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services report, which reflects data from the 2019 calendar year.

So much of MTN's success is credited to our incredible donation community: our transplant center and hospital partners as well as the generosity of those in our service area who say "yes" to donation. Our volunteer Ambassadors and licensing, treasury and Department of Revenue partners also are vital to these accomplishments. We are grateful for everyone who plays a role in the donation process, and we look forward to saving and enhancing more lives together in 2022 and beyond.


Partnership Gives New Meaning to Donation in Uncertain Times

In addition to the many obvious devastating impacts COVID-19 has had on communities worldwide, the pandemic also impacted the number of transplants provided to transplant centers from organ procurement organizations. With so many unknowns throughout the early months, out of an abundance of caution for recipients, transplant centers nationally declined organs from potential donors who tested positive for the coronavirus.


In 2021, Midwest Transplant Network began recovering organs from COVID-19 positive donors, beginning with kidneys in partnership with Alvin Wee, MD, MBA, Program Director — Kidney Transplantation from the Cleveland Clinic. From July 27 – Dec. 31, 2021, 46 kidneys, five livers, two hearts and one pancreas were transplanted from MTN donors who were COVID-19 positive at the time they went to the operating room.

"Out of these unfortunate deaths we are seeing, our partnership is bringing meaning," said Dr. Wee. "This is something that we should be proud of."

In December, we began recovering tissues from donors in the new operating room of our Donor Care and Surgical Recovery Unit. This specialized facility at MTN's headquarters will help streamline donation processes for organ and tissue donors.




Paired Donation Program Launches to Support Living Donation

Strong partnerships with hospitals and transplant centers are vital to MTN's success. As part of our efforts to lead organ, eye and tissue donation through excellence, quality and partnerships, the Laboratory team was pleased to launch the MTN Kidney Paired Donation (KPD) Program in 2021.

Through careful policy development and tailored matching software, the MTN KPD Program offers a way to help patients find compatible living donors. Transplant program partners can add their recipient and living donor pairs to the MTN KPD Program to search for compatible transplant options to maximize the gift of living donation. MTN and the Laboratory team are dedicated to helping the transplant community increase the number of kidney transplants from living donors and to improving recipient-donor matches for optimal outcomes. This effort is in alignment with the Health Resources & Services Administration's End-Stage Renal Disease Treatment Choices Learning Collaborative goals.


Increasing Referrals Help Increase Organs for Transplant

MTN expanded our referral criteria in 2021. The expanded criteria are the result of recognizing an increase in the number of family-initiated donation discussions for patients without a neurological injury. We began tracking non-neurologically injured donation after circulatory death (DCD) data and outcomes from Jan. 1, 2020, through May 31, 2021, to see if there was an opportunity to save more lives — and there was.

MTN recovered organs from 31 out of 40 eligible donors, who were ventilated patients suffering from interstitial lung disease, pneumonia, respiratory failure or COVID-19. We thank our hospital partners for their role in a 78% conversion rate, which helped transplant an additional 39 recipients during that timeframe.

Starting July 1, 2021, the expanded criteria became our standard of practice. Doing so provided an increased opportunity for donor heroes and their families to create this legacy and save lives. Because of our partner hospitals' great care of donors and their families in support of organ donation, an additional 41 organs were transplanted through December 2021 for a total of 80 based on these new criteria.

We will continue refining our processes and working closely with our partners to save even more lives going forward. This is the nature of the MTN team and how we adapt to the ever-changing nature of donation and transplantation.

Fifth Annual Donate Life Legacy Walk Reaches Global Audience

After a completely virtual Donate Life Legacy Walk in 2020, we were so pleased to bring the event back to life in person as well as virtually. We saw participation from 14 states, Washington, D.C., Mexico and Spain through our all-day programming on social media, and nearly 1,900 in-person registrants enjoyed time together set to the talents of cover band Funk Syndicate. The National WWI Museum and Memorial was the perfect venue to celebrate the event and will set the stage again on June 4, 2022, as donor families, recipients and others raise awareness of the need for organ, eye and tissue donation.

DONOR FAMILY SUPPORT

Connecting in Person and Virtually to Honor Donor Heroes

Although we faced continued challenges in 2021 associated with the coronavirus pandemic, we were grateful to connect in person with donor families at events for the first time since early 2020. Additionally, we provided multiple virtual connection opportunities, allowing us to support families in our service area and beyond.

In October, we joined donor families at Warm Springs Ranch in Boonville, Missouri, to honor donor heroes with a sand ceremony and tour of the home of the Budweiser Clydesdales. Families could also view the Donor Memorial Quilt that was on display, pick up donation-related goodies and enjoy dinner together outside.

We enjoyed celebrating the holiday season and the gift of life with donor families at Hope for the Holidays, held in 2021 in Kansas City's historic Union Station. Families could bring ornaments honoring their loved one to hang on an MTN-branded tree that was on display through early January. The tree drew attention from many Union Station visitors — including several donor families — long after the event. Multiple families said the display was meaningful in honoring their loved one and that they hoped it would inspire people to join the organ, eye and tissue donor registry.


